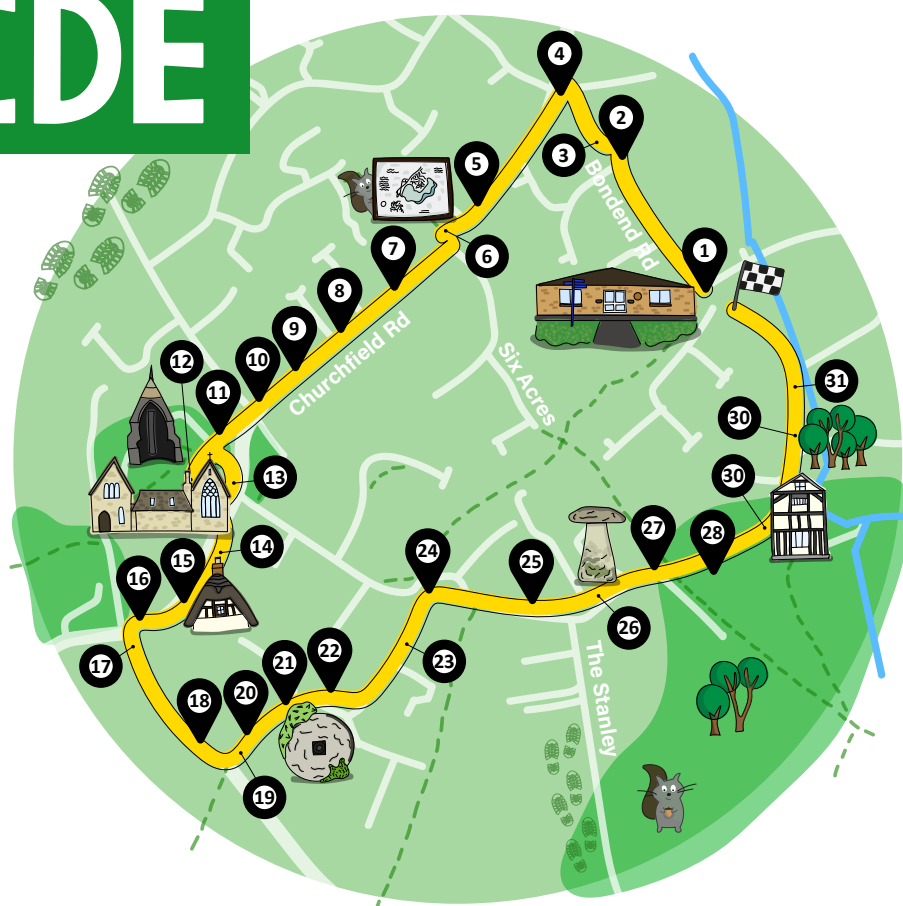


**Welcome to the GO

Follow the directions and answer questions on your way around the village.



Directions

Puzzles and Facts

1

Start with the school behind you and turn left down the road

2

Cross over when you see a gate in the hedge to your right.

What animals can you see here? The farm you can see from here has been there since the 1800's when it was a corn mill.

3

Cross back over and continue walking down the road, away from the school

4

Turn left at the crossroads, heading up the hill

5

Continue past Woodlands House on your right

What animal can you spot sitting on their gate post?

6

Cross over the road towards the Post Office

What is St. Leonard the patron saint of? Have a look at the map here to find the answer

7

Continue walking up Churchfield Road

As well as helping pregnant women and prisoners, what is St Leonard famous for?

- A) Dragon slaying
- B) Baptising the poor
- C) Healing the sick

8

Pass number 13 on your right

What sport might you be able to play here?

9

Keep walking up the road, pass Nevin Villa on your left

What do you think 'Nevin' means?

- A) Sacred
- B) Holy
- C) Little bone

10

Continue along the road, passing an old house on the corner

This is Churchfield House and is nearly 200 years old! Can you spot where some windows used to be. Why do you think they have been bricked up?

11

Turn right, through the rotating gate and into the church yard

Can you find the stone with a bell on?

12

Can you find the large wheel inside a stone 'house'?

What do you think this was used for?

13

Head back towards the main road with the old building on your right

What do you think this was originally used for?

14

When you get back onto the main road turn right and head down the hill

Walk past No.2 on your left- what animals can you spot here?

15

Look out for a thatched cottage on your left

Did you know- thatched cottages mostly only exist today because landlords were too stingy to pay for a more expensive tiled roof (despite it being much safer!)

16

Cross over the road here as the footpath disappears

What can you see on the wall of The Lodge?
What it is normally used for?

17

Turn left here and walk up the High Street

What animals can you spot in the field on your right. Be careful- there is no pavement on this road

18

Walk past Quercus cottage on your left

What do you think Quercus means?
A) A mythical creature
B) A type of tree
C) An exotic fruit

19

Turn left into Perry Orchard

As the name suggests this land used to be Orchards- what fruit do you think grew here?

20

Continue up the road

A house on your left is named after a fruit- can you spot it?

21

Keep your eyes peeled for anything unusual on your right

Have a look in the front garden of number 67- What is there?

22

Follow the road around to the right and then to the left

There is an animal in the garden of No. 13 can you spot him?

23

Carry on, past the allotments on your right

Do you recognise any of the plants growing there?

24

Turn right at the end of the road

If you want to take a short cut back to school go straight on here, following the footpath

25

Walk past No.21a on your right

What spot is being played on the roof here?

26

Keep going, past Abbey View on your left.

There are lots of stone mushrooms here- what are they?

27

Next you will pass a large stone house on your left

This looks quite old! But when was it actually built?

28

Be careful walking along the road as the pavement disappears again

29

Can you see the old mill buildings on your right hand side?

The Mill has been here since the early 1800's. What do you think it produced?

- A) Corn
- B) Cloth
- C) Oil

30

Come around the corner and walk under a row of 4 trees

Do you know what type of tree these are?

31

Continue walking along the left hand side of the road

How many different colour flowers can you see on the signs for Woodhay and Little Combe?

32

Arrive back at school

Answers:

- 5) An Owl! There are more owls around the village- see if you can spot another later on during this walk.
- 7) A! During his time as a hermit, apparently St Leonard saved a village from a vicious dragon too!
- 8) Golf! They have a putting green on the lawn.
- 9) All 3! It is a Latin word which is also a surname meaning 'saint'- perhaps the house is named after a family of saints!
- 10) This is because of the Window tax- introduced in 1696 it meant the more windows you had the more money you had to pay!
- 12) This may have been used as a pump- the wheel used to power it
- 13) It was a school, built in 1845. It is a very beautiful building- how many different types of window can you count?
- 14) There are meerkats, ducks, a rabbit and another owl- look carefully at the ornaments and signs on the walls
- 16) A compass- these are normally used to help you to find your way, although this one is just ornamental
- 18) despite sounding very exotic it actually is a group of trees or shrubs which include oaks- you might spot some along here
- 19) The name suggests Pears- a Perry is a cider made from Pears rather than Apples
- 20) Cherry- can you spot any Cherry trees in their garden?
- 21) It is likely this is a Mill Stone. There has been a building here since the 1840's so perhaps this was originally used to make flour.
- 22) There is a cat on the weather vane if you look up above the fence
- 25) Hunting- there are dogs and a figure shooting on the weather vane
- 26) These are Staddle stones. They were used to support hay stacks or granaries to lift them up and protect them from animals or flooding and are likely from Beech Farm which used to sit in this location
- 27) 2020!
- 29) A- Corn. Likely grown in the many fields surrounding the village
- 30) Pine- you might be able to spot the pine cones on the tree or on the ground if any have fallen
